

Planning for Ashmont school progressing

St. Paul Education Regional Division (SPERD) provided an update on the future of a replacement school for the community of Ashmont, scheduled to be completed in 2017.

“The K-12 school will provide approximately 7,190 square meters of space and will address identified building and programming needs,” according to a media release from SPERD.

The school is now in the design phase and a public unveiling of the early design will be shared with community members and stakeholders later this year.

“This will give community members an opportunity to receive information and provide feedback on the new school,” says the release.

“The board is delighted with the progress to date and looks forward to a new school that will provide a positive educational experience for students and staff and will incorporate educa-

tional best practices,” says Heather Starosielski, SPERD board chair.

The 2014-15 combined enrolment of the elementary and junior/senior high wings was 600 students. Plans for a modernized school shifted to the construction of a new school in late 2014 following a two-day session to evaluate the modernizations.

In December of 2014, Starosielski said she was optimistic about the plans moving forward. At that time, it was estimated that the planning process would take about one year.
